It is the time of the year as school comes to an end for another year, (148th for St Mary's School I believe) where we reconnect with those who have had a large influence on our lives, that we may have been a little too busy to connect with throughout the year. To centre ourselves and think of the new year upon us and what our goals and aspirations are for not only ourselves but for others as well.

We are steadily shifting as a school and have already completed most of the planning for 2020 which has brought a sense of calm over all those involved in the details and timing. Great to have plans, a direction and be able to modify if and when needed.

The builders have been in today and looked at the work to be done around the shifting of the playground and repurposing of spaces here at school. The work will begin in February next year and will see another major shift in our physical environment, allowing for the new learning space to be developed in front of rooms 3 - 6 and also tripling the size of the current playground on the Maxwell Road boundary.

Peppercorn Tree (Stevenson Street, Maxwell Street corner)



It was with great regret and sadness that the famous Peppercorn Tree which also has many other names (ask your children) had to be removed last Saturday morning. The tree had been assessed in 2017 and was seen to be in a bit of strife. Over the last two years, we have removed limbs that are deemed unsafe or dangerous. Unfortunately, it was assessed a fortnight ago and there was no sign of improvement

of a safe future for the tree as it was the main climbing tree of the school.

At Friday prayers we shared prayer as a school and thanked God for this wonderful tree which had meant so much to so many children over the years it has been with us. We also prayed that one of the 15 native trees that were planted on the boundary last term would have the same effect and grow to have as much legendary status as the Peppercorn Tree had.

We, as a school then went to the tree and had some photos taken as it reflected how much the tree meant and what it represented to so many pupils.

Learning Through Play

At St Mary's School Year 0-4 teachers implement a learning through play approach in their classrooms.

Why Learning Through Play?

Research shows that children learn best through play. Learning through play allows for social, emotional, and cognitive development at a rate that is appropriate for the child. Play promotes creativity, imagination, initiative, responsible risk-taking, resilience and communication skills. In a play-based classroom the children's learning is based on their interests and developmental stages. Research shows that when we are curious, we learn more and we remember what we have learned.

What is Play?

According to (Gray, 2013; Brewer, 2007) play needs to be;

- 1. self-chosen and self-directed;
- 2. process rather than product-driven;
- 3. contains structures or rules established by the players themselves;
- 4. imaginative, non-literal and removed from reality;
- 5. occurs between those who are active, alert and non-stressed.

In a learning through play classroom there are lots of discussions between students, creating through the use of loose parts, thinking, reflecting and modifying. Children are engaged as they are driving their own learning.

Role of the Teacher

In a learning through play classroom the teacher's role is vital as the teacher:

- Provides an environment that allows children to develop and pursue their interests.
- Observes the play and has conversations with the children. This enables the teacher to set up provocations for children to further develop their interests and skills.
- Makes links to the curriculum to recognise the learning within the play.

- Gives coaching statements and answers questions which take the learning to a higher level.
- Provides reflection time for the children to make connections to the Beatitudes, NZ Curriculum and Key Competencies.
- Provides direct teaching in Reading, Writing and Mathematics at a pace that is developmentally appropriate for the child.

On the 25th of November year 5 to 8 went down to Picton to see the replica of the Endeavor. We went on the replica of the Endeavor and one of the crew members spoke to us about the ship and gave us a tour, he was talking about what they did on it and some facts.
